RE: Protest for Petition for Change for Water Right License 3404 (Application 9686) and Permit 20789 (Application 29981) of Garberville Sanitary District (GSD)

Dear Administrative Hearing Office:

The current Board of Directors as well myself, Cody Cox, the General Manager/Operations Manager for the Redway Community Services District (RCSD) since July 2020, continue to support the concerns outlined by previous upper Management in three separate letters dated August 28<sup>th</sup>, 2019, November 25<sup>th</sup>, 2019, and June 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2020.

While we support the SHCP as a venue for both its current outdoor activities and some events, we are still worried about potential expansion. The volumetric expansion impacts to downstream users of the South Fork of the Eel River could be dire, especially now.

We are already fearing severe drought and a longer even more serious wildfire season. If the river continues to drop, there could be serious water quality issues, major water storage concerns, and then ultimately not being able to produce enough water to keep up with the general demand to our ratepayers.

The SHCP would like to be able to provide drinking water, by installing water fountains, for visitors to the park. Most people who engage in outdoor activities such as hiking, biking, etc. are generally accustomed to packing a water bottle with them. I have been working in the Water and Wastewater Industry for over 18 years, and it is in my experience, that there could be significant water quality issues with long extended laterals attached to these low flow water fountains.



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The common practice for any local water agency when trying to maintain a reasonable chlorine residual which is needed to be able to maintain a safe potable drinking water for users is to establish a flushing program. Flushing is needed in Distribution systems that have exceedingly long laterals, or low to no flow situations. This preventative maintenance would include daily Chlorine monitoring, performed by a California Certified Water Distribution Operator, followed by the necessary flushing needed to maintain the Chlorine Residual in the potable water line.

The flushing that may be needed to maintain the Chlorine Residual could be excessive and could add to conservation measures.
